Dragon's Den idea a NZ first



Share Your Space is a way that Bronwyn Bay found to help parents juggling motherhood with business get a good few hours work in at a shared working space while their children are cared for on site.

AN IDEA pitched at the Valley Project's Dragon's Den event has now become reality and is leading the rest of the country in community innovation for working parents.

The Valley Project is collaborating with Share Your Space to offer a regular shared working space in the community rooms aimed at parents with the provision of a child-minding service on-site. The initiative runs on Mondays from 11.30am to 2.30pm.

Share Your Space founder Bronwyn Bay says, to her knowledge, this is the first shared working space in New Zealand that provides a child-minding service.

"A lot of us don't want to put our children in all day care. We just need a few hours, maybe once

or twice a week, and we can get screeds done." "Having the child-minding next door means we are right there if our child needs a cuddle or breast feeding."

The Valley Project is supporting the initiative and has a Memorandum of Understanding with Share Your Space, with a longer term goal that the idea will bring in a small income for the Project from the regular use of the community rooms.

Bronwyn says it is important to her that the initiative is community-led. With that in mind she ran a few pop-up shared working spaces to gather feedback from community members about what worked or didn't work for them.

AED a lifesaver for our community

WE ARE very excited to now have an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) available at the Valley Project .

It is currently housed in our office, but we are working on getting a box with breakable glass to keep it outside the community rooms so it will be available to our community 24/7.

What is an AED, you might ask? Think of those movie scenes where paddles are stuck to the chest of an unresponsive character and then someone shouts, "Clear!" – that's an AED.

Without getting too technical here, an AED is a portable medical device that can automatically assess a patient's heart rhythm. It judges whether defibrillation is needed and, if required, administers an electric shock through the chest wall to the heart.

Anyone can use an AED – you don't have to be qualified. It has voice and visual prompts to guide your through the rescue.

The majority of people suffering a sudden cardiac arrest can't be resuscitated using CPR alone, their survival rate drops with every minute they wait for an ambulance to turn up with an AED.

Performing first aid in an emergency situation is a scary scenario for anyone, but knowing you have an AED on hand to use in such an instance is a massive relief. It's kind of like a spare key for your home – you don't realise how much it means to have one until you really, really need it.—*Edith Leigh, Valley Voice editor*

Community fruit trees flourishing

MOST OF the community fruit trees in North East Valley and Pine Hill are looking good, with apples, pears and hazelnuts starting to mature. Fruit won't be ripe until later in March. Apples come off the tree easily with a light twist when they are ripe. Their pips inside will have turned brown.

Sometimes we see unripe fruit lying on the ground under the tree with human bite marks – people are still learning when it's the right time to pick! Fruit won't ripen off the tree if it's picked too early. So patience, Grasshopper!

The trees are still young, so there's not a lot of fruit yet. Please don't take all the fruit, just a few at this stage. Hopefully, in the future, with care from people in the neighbourhood, there will be a lot more to go around. This year there may

only be four walnuts on the tree, but in the future there could easily be 400!

Let us know if you can help care for the trees. It's very enjoyable to meet up with others for an hour's "work".

If anyone needs apples this season contact Kristen about community fruit picking. Tree owners in the neighbourhood who can't pick their trees but don't want the fruit to go to waste have kindly offered them for redistribution in the community.

WHEN I look across the valley to the verdant faces of the Quarry Garden, covered in trees, it is hard to imagine that it was once a scene of noisy and dangerous industry.

A quarry that regularly disrupted the valley with weekly window-rattling blasts to break up the rock, bits of which, in the early days, occasionally became missiles peppering the nearby shops, factories, homes, and backyards (and the school on at least one occasion!).

North East Valley quarry, also known as Calder's quarry and later Palmer's quarry, was one of the first quarries in Dunedin, opening before 1880. Aggregate – small bits of rock – was needed for developing the city, in particular its roads.

The quarry started off life as a 13-million-year-old knob of an unusual volcanic rock called phonolite, which means 'sounding stone' because of the ringing noise it makes if you hit a nice, unfractured piece of it with a hammer.

I was hoping there might be something exciting about phonolite that makes it an exceptional aggregate. So I asked Tony Hunter (whose father Jim bought the quarry in the 1950s and who still lives in the valley) why the phonolite in particular was quarried.

Tony explained that while phonolite is nice and hard, the site was probably chosen for the same reason that quarry sites are chosen today: because it was handy. It was simply a convenient rock face next to the creek.

Early on the quarry was a vertical face much closer to the creek, with men dangling down on ropes to drill holes in the rock by

hand for blasting. Later the quarry was one of the first to cut benches, which made working the quarry much less life-threatening.

Over 100 years the hill was munched away, bit by bit, and eventually five to six million tonnes of rock was carted away from the site.

My other question for Tony was: where did all the rock end up? After being blown up, the bits of rock were taken to a crusher and pounded into aggregate. These little bits of North East Valley were spread along the roads of Dunedin and cemented into concrete for all manner of structures, including the new hospital block built in the late 1970s. It was never used as building stone.

Eventually Jim Hunter decided that he didn't need to operate both his Valley quarry and Logan Point quarry, and because the Valley quarry was more bothersome to its neighbours, it closed in 1980.

The quarry today is a far cry from the bare rock face. Jim decided to pretty it up into an award-winning quarry garden. During the 1990s the quarry pit was filled in, levelled and grassed, 200 cubic metres of topsoil and 500 tonnes of compost mix were bought in, and over 35,000 shrubs and trees were planted, making it one of the prettiest spots in the Valley.

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
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Bee garden puts on a showy display
